Prof. David Welbourn reflects on the Circuit Open Day

Museum Street hosted a circuit open day on Saturday 30th October on the eve of the COP26 conference. This marked the completion of the first time around the 9-week cycle beginning on Climate Sunday and continuing through to the COP26 conference

The theme of Learn, Speak, Act, Hope, which has held the campaign together throughout the 9weeks was continued in the Open Day. Material from each of the 9-weeks was summarised on an A1 poster, with all 9 weeks put on display as the learning area of the exhibition. Four of the petitions were selected, along with template letters



for each of the 5 Suffolk MPs for people to take away and forward. A single letter was written to the Prime Minister, urging UK to take global leadership in accepting more aggressive targets than whatever is agreed at COP26. Letters of greeting were sent to Glasgow and by hand to the Pacific islands. A third section highlighted many of the ways to be green – the tip of the day messages on the website. Those at the event were also encouraged to make a personal pledge of something they would do differently.

The sidechapel was set-up as a prayer centre in which we held a vigil throughout the open day – offering prayers of hope for COP26 success.

One of the key messages of hope is that there is a plethora of technology solutions all capable of making a difference, if we pull together to support and adopt them.

One of the students from Essex University was most enthusiastic in sharing her work to help improve the viability of plants in new and more challenging environments.

Above all though, the day was made by the presence of Rev James Bhagwan.

He is General Secretary of the Pacific Conference of Churches and gave a powerful first hand testimony of what climate change is like as a lived reality for many people on the small Pacific islands.

It is impossible to do justice to the power and challenge of his message, without hearing him direct.

This was a challenging, rewarding and successful day. It is too tempting to describe it as an event celebrating the completion of our 9-week intense



cycle – but that would be to miss the point completely. This 9-weeks is just the beginning. It is the preparation phase, for the start of the rest of our lives – lives in which we MUST choose how we are going to respond to the things we have learnt, and take our steps forward in glorious hope, in the battle for climate justice.

DO NOT let that event mark the end of our actions. Museum Street members are invited to please join us in our discussion on the evening of the 18th November to see how we as local church take forward our discipleship and commitment to creation and to the communities within it.

What does it mean?

'Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid.'

"Not knowing" brings its own kind of terror. Experience makes people less nervous to drive cars, fly in airplanes, endure thunderstorms, or receive medical injections. The experiences,



themselves, don't change. What changes is the person's expectations—they know what is happening, and what will happen next. That brings confidence and greatly reduces fear. It brings peace.

Several times in this discourse, Jesus will point out that He is preparing the disciples to "hold fast" in a difficult time. This not only applies to His impending arrest and execution, but to the persecution Christians will face because of their faith.

The peace that Christ offers is not like that of the world. The best we can expect from the natural world is unfairness and death. Even attempts to be moral, without God, lead only to frustration. Christ's "peace" here refers to a hope and reassurance that goes beyond what a fallen world can offer. It is permanent, guaranteed, and eternal.

Here, again, Christ encourages His followers to keep their "hearts" from fear and trouble. This repeats the statement Jesus used to start this message, immediately after predicting Peter's cowardice. Here, again, scholars suggest that Jesus is distinguishing between being troubled in one's "spirit," meaning pain and unhappiness, as opposed to being troubled in one's "heart," meaning fear and despair. Jesus was said to have a troubled spirit, at times. What He calls for here is not for Christians to be stone-faced and inhuman. Rather, it's to acknowledge the reality of suffering while at the same time trusting in God to make good on His promises.

A VISIT TO MINSMERE

David Howlett reflects on a visit with a difference...

On the BBC Radio 4 programme Ramblings, Clare Balding the broadcaster, journalist, author and former jockey meets notable and interesting people for a walk through the countryside. On March 25th 2021 the walk was recorded from Minsmere. Arabella Marshall a glass artist meets Clare and their focus is a rather old chapel. Bleak and broken it stands on the marshes near to Eastbridge It is this that provided Arabella with the inspiration for a major work of art - a new stained-glass window fitted into one of the ruin's old apertures.



History

The Domesday Survey of 1086

recorded 6 households at Minsmere, headed by a freeman with one plough team.

In the 14th century 10 homesteads made up the small village - and all lost to the sea.

King Henry's II Chief Justice Ranulf de Glanvill founded a Premonstratensian Abbey on the marshes in 1182. Severe flooding in the 14th century occurred and the site was abandoned in 1363.

Before Minsmere became a nature reserve, the area was the site of an ancient abbey and a Tudor artillery battery. Stone from the buildings were used to rebuild Leiston Abbey 2.1 miles further inland, the only visible structure remaining is the ruined chapel of St. Mary's built within the nave of the former church site and abandoned in 1537.

Marshes were reclaimed as farmland in the 19th century but re-flooded as a protection against invasion during World War II.

The Glass Art Project

Arabella describes herself as an architectural and environmental glass artist. She hopes her work enhances and brings a soulfulness to the environment. The work was funded by the Arts Council for England, local trusts and many individual contributions. Five years ago, Arabella was walking across Minsmere and came across the ruined chapel, as she made for home, she got the idea that it would be marvellous to make a kind of window for the old ruin. Arabella prefers to work with glass which is stained and fused in a furnace and allows the light to shine through.

The chapel sits in a peaceful, tranquil area. The nuclear power station at Sizewell is a paradox on the landscape in this rural surrounding.

The artist thought the project would take about 1-2 years, but 5 years later (October 2020) the work was ready for installation.

The glass had to be thick enough to withstand the coastal wind in this area, ten layers of sheet glass measuring 30mm were required and the window is 2.3metres in height. The bottom section is in a steel frame with the top section frameless. The amazing glass colours include shades of red, orange, yellow, blue, purple, brown, gold and amber. The sections are separated by clear zones and the colours in the top section soar up to sky.

The weight of the glass made the installation of the window a tricky and lengthy operation. When they had finished the installer remarked that it looked like it has always been there.

A written description does not do justice to the finished article.

Arabella has named the window A Wing and a Prayer.

On viewing a picture of the window StF Number 693 sums up the effect.

Museum Street Church Council

Every three years, Church Councils are responsible for reviewing the work of their appointed worship leaders. Barbara Wearne had reluctantly decided to retire from the role which was now proving increasingly difficult. Betty Lindsay was unanimously approved to continue. Council acknowledged that with the shortage of ministers and preachers in the circuit, the call being made on worship leaders is increasingly demanding. Council recorded their thanks for the dedication and quality of leadership they have provided.

DW presented the full year financial accounts for the year ended August 2021. He thanked members for the tremendous way they had risen to the pleas for people to review their giving, with a magnificent 23% increase in regular giving. The simple bottom line was that the church made a small surplus of £111 on the year which was almost unimaginable in mid-year.

The volatile nature of the year made it especially difficult to compare like-forlike finances, with some income and some expenditure both deferred into the current year. David is hopeful that the current year (2021/22) will enable us to meet our commitment of repaying some of the borrowed reserves, subject of course to further uncertainty as we are still affected by the pandemic.

Council considered the prospect of including online communion as we move towards streaming services on a more regular basis, following the debate at conference. This was agreed in principle, and Council gave permission to the leadership team to consider the logistics of how we might make this work, considering both the spiritual aspects and practical matters such as privacy.

Council also had a preliminary discussion about the "God in love unites us" report and agreed that it was important to hold an open study group in the spring so that we could learn more, before taking a vote at the February meeting.
