MINISTER'S MESSAGE

DEAR FRIENDS IN CHRIST

We are now in Advent waiting with anticipation and hopefulness for the coming of Christ into the world once again. This time last year, we were in the midst of COVID travel restrictions and limits on gatherings. So, while the nights are physically getting longer and darker, this year the world feels like a brighter place and with precautions being put in place, our Christmas Festivities are set to go ahead. Jesus, the Light and Hope of the World, is coming.

This year I am wondering how to celebrate Christmas in a climate conscious way. What does a sustainable Christmas look like? What gift will I give Creation this Christmas?

I have started by asking myself these questions:

- What does it mean to love our neighbours at Christmas and who is my neighbour?
- What if my neighbour is the person living in the midst of drought or flooding or pollution because of the amount of carbon I am helping to put into the atmosphere?
- Or how about those around the world being exploited for unfair wages and living in poverty so that I can eat and have cheap goods?
- What if my neighbour is the earth and all the plants and animals?
- Is there a way that my extravagance, after keeping my gift-giving and consuming to a responsible level, can then be mitigated in a way that benefits the earth?

To help creation and our neighbours around the world suffering from climate change and exploitation, I will keep my carbon footprint as low as possible. I know that light pollution from Christmas lights is a problem, I will use LED festive lights and ensure they are only on for a limited time – enough to bring enjoyment and lift spirits without being excessive. For Christmas Dinner, I will eat seasonal vegetables grown and sourced locally, and not trucked and shipped around the world. While we will have chicken or turkey, I will replace the bacon-wrapped sausages with plant-based sausages. I will look for gifts that avoid plastic where possible and for wrapping paper made from recycled paper and then I will attempt to wrap those gifts in a tape-free manner. Or I might even use recycled magazines as gift-wrap. I have found lots of suggestions online by searching for sustainable or alternate or ethical Christmas gifts.

MINISTER'S MESSAGE

For many years now, we have liked to pick a charity at Christmas who offer gifts that empower people, like gifts of animals (cows, sheep, rabbits, chickens, bees) or tools or seeds or gifts that improve sanitation, health and access to clean water. We then 'buy' for example a flock of chicks or an irrigation pump,



and then friends and relatives receive a card at Christmas telling them about the gift. Charities here like All We Can, Christian Aid and Oxfam offer these types of charity gifts.

However, I realise that my life is far from carbon neutral, so Adrian and I are also looking this year at some companies and charities that plant trees in the UK and around the world. We will pick one and donate some trees to offset our Christmas carbon footprint. Our children may even receive some trees planted in their name.

The Incarnation – the mystery of God coming into this world as the baby Jesus in human form – demonstrates the same project of love as was at the origin of Creation. It constitutes a bridge between God and humanity, and between God and the created world. As we read the birth story this year in the gospel of Luke, we will ponder again how the shepherds with their sheep were the first to hear the good news. It is a telling of how God was born among the very ordinary people amidst their struggle and their suffering. The whole of creation is groaning. All that God has created is included in the Christmas story.

Where does Creation appear on your Christmas list of relatives, friends and neighbours? And how much will you spend on Creation? Wishing you all a blessed and Happy Christmas!

So, let us pray and re-affirm our faith -


I love you Jesus.

Prince of Peace: He has secured peace by His cross and resurrection, and so we can find in Him true acceptance, forgiveness and peace for our lives, relationships and future.




WHO SAVED CHRISTMAS

After the Civil War, when Oliver Cromwell and his Puritans abolished Christmas celebrations (amongst other things), Christmas was just another working day and nobody wished each other 'Happy Christmas' because it wasn't! Even the restoration of the Monarchy didn't help matters and by the early 19th century, the burgeoning industrial revolution was taking over. A lot of villagers had moved to the towns and cities. Industrial output was the prime consideration and it seemed that the rural Twelve Days of Christmas celebrations would soon be confined to history.

Then, in 1843, 'A Christmas Carol' by Charles Dickens was published and, although he was hoping that Christmas might return to the more joyful times that his forebears had known, what he really wanted was to turn a profit from his book. So, to publicise the book, he gave readings of his tale, sometimes for charity but usually for a fee for himself. But so many people were touched by the story and by his 'gift of the gab', that some of the factory owners decided that perhaps they should shut their premises on Christmas Day and give their workers the day off to be with family and friends!

As a child, Dickens' life had been bleak. He'd worked in Warren's boot-blacking factory and his own parents were never as family-minded as the Cratchits. Ironically, through this best-seller and his subsequent writings, he became as rich as his hero, Ebenezer Scrooge. All the money he made turned him into a passionate champion of the poor, campaigning for changes to the child labour

laws and improvements to the conditions in the workhouses. 'A Christmas Carol' really caught on, as did the Christmas celebrations that he had written about. No longer did people work on the day itself but the return to a twelve-day party was not to be achieved until our own recent times. But people could, and did, spend Christmas Eve and Christmas Day with their families, and they could also find time to spread a little good will among the poorer people of the towns. So, who saved Christmas? Why, Ebenezer Scrooge of course!

We have now come to this time of the year when I ask if I could please have your home collection boxes by mid-December, so that they can be opened, the total can be banked and the details sent to Action for Children.



IT WAS.....REMEMBER.....

- **127 years ago**, on 3rd Dec 1894 that Robert Louis Stevenson died. This Scottish novelist, short story writer, poet, essayist and travel writer was best known for his novels Treasure Island, Kidnapped and the Strange Case of Dr Jekyll and Mr Hyde.
- **102 years ago**, on 1st Dec 1919 that Lady Nancy Astor became the first female Member of Parliament (MP) to take her seat in the House of Commons.
- **92 years ago**, on 12th Dec 1929 that John Osborne, British playwright, screenwriter and producer, was born. He was the first of the Angry Young Men, and best known for his play Look Back in Anger (died 1994).
- **82 years ago**, on 1st Dec 1939 that Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer made his first ever appearance, in a children's colouring book given away by Montgomery Ward stores in the USA.
- **52 years ago**, on 18th Dec 1969 that the British Government abolished the death penalty for murder.
- **42 years ago**, on 20th Dec 1979 that the British Government announced that council tenants would be given the right to buy their homes under a new Housing Act (effective from October 1980)
- **32 years ago**, on 22nd December 1989 that the Brandenburg Gate in Berlin was reopened, effectively reuniting East and West Germany.
- **20 years ago**, on 1st Dec 1999 that an international team of scientists announced that they had mapped an entire human chromosome. (All human chromosomes were mapped by April 2003.)
- **22 years ago**, on 31 Dec 1999 that the London Eye, at that time the world's tallest Ferris wheel was officially opened on the banks of the River Thames.
- **17 years ago**, on 26th Dec 2004 that a massive undersea earthquake near Sumatra caused a devastating tsunami that swamped coastal areas in Indonesia, Sri Lanka, India, Thailand and Africa. It killed 230,000 people in 14 countries.

ENERGY AND OUR CHURCH BUILDING

David Welbourn outlines the start of our new journey.

If you followed our climate justice campaign, you will be aware that changing our attitude to energy is an important step in reversing climate change. At the same time as our focus on the environment has forced us to see energy in a new light, energy has also been in the spotlight for very different reasons. The forecourt panic and long queues when too few



lorry drivers caused petrol deliveries to dry up, showed just how deeply ingrained in society is our energy addiction.

As if that wasn't enough to concentrate the mind, there is another energy crisis caused by the lack of resilience in global wholesale energy markets driving prices through the roof. Look behind the scenes, and the blame is laid at rapid growth in demand as the shut-down world opened up again to economic activity. To date, twenty-one energy companies have failed – all driven by an economic view of the world that places cheapness as its main driver.

Tough times ahead to push forward on our fight for climate justice against the volatility of markets, skill shortages, and all the other self-inflicted wounds on society.

Much of that is of course out of our control. So, when we come closer to home, are we doing everything that we can and should be doing? What more can we do as a church and as individuals?

At Museum Street, our carbon footprint has four components:

- the energy we use to heat the building;
- the energy we use to light the building;
- the footprint associated with all other services on which we rely waste, water, etc.;
- the footprint created by all the users of the premises as they travel to meetings that we host.

Sadly, we use gas to heat the building, and we have only just spent a lot of money installing new boilers.

Were we to make the decision now, we would be looking seriously at a combination of electric boiler and heat pump, but even just three years ago those alternatives were either not available or not an obvious choice. The good news is that our new system is substantially more efficient than our old boilers. We don't know exactly how much more efficient, as we've been closed and had lower usage of the buildings, but we may be saving as much as one third of the energy we used to use in heating. That is around 8 tonnes of carbon equivalent we are saving.

Our energy contract was up for renewal in mid-2020, and I selected Octopus as the greenest energy supplier at the time. They still hold that slot, producing all of their electricity from renewables whilst also continuing to invest in more renewable capacity. In June this year, I moved onto a 2-year fixed tariff which also offset much of the carbon associated with our gas usage and fortunately gives us a little cushion against current price rises.

Lighting accounts for around one quarter of the energy we use. We have started looking into more efficient lighting. In January, we will be replacing some of the lights in the sanctuary with LEDs, as a trial. If that is successful, we will replace all in the sanctuary to save more than ½ tonne of carbon equivalent per year. We will recover the price of the lamps by the savings in the first year.

It is harder to find good solution for other rooms which mainly use fluorescent tubes that are reasonably efficient. We could save some, but with small savings and payback taking several years, replacement is not the right answer, especially if we take into account the waste footprint of those we needlessly throw away. Instead, we are looking at alternative ways to save energy in those rooms – perhaps reducing brightness, or using motion sensors to switch lights off in empty rooms. We will report back later. *Continued over*

A quick estimate suggests that the carbon footprint of travel for those who use the building is roughly equivalent to the footprint from our own energy consumption. I will share more thoughts about offsetting next month.

As a final note on being climate conscious in everything we do. I've just bought a new monitor as part of the church's technology for streaming. Like all electrical equipment now, monitors are efficiency rated. Most are classed as D to F in their energy rating (A is the best). After a lot of searching, I found and bought an A+ monitor. It was a little over 20% more expensive than the cheapest available. If climate justice is worth fighting for, it's worth paying for too, as part of our discipleship.

We are faced with similar choices on a daily basis.

A SPECIAL STAR





Karolyn has done a Christmas Acrostic for you and I've followed that up with a nice easy way to make regular five pointed stars for Christmas decorations".

Make your own Christmas Star Decoration.

A simple and easy way to draw a respectable looking five-pointed star only requires a strip of paper. If you want to make a star with an approximate diameter of two inches, cut a strip of paper one inch wide and about eight inches long. If you want to make a one-inch diameter star, a strip one half inch wide and about four inches long will work nicely. Now tie the paper strip into a loose overhand knot. Slowly tighten it and snug the knot tighter until it forms a pentagon with a five-sided figure, with each side equal to the width of the strip. You can cut the ends shorter or simply fold them out of the way to form a simple but nice pentagon. Put the pentagon knot on a piece of paper and trace the five equal sides or simply mark a dot on the paper at each of the five corners of the pentagon. Now it is a simple task to use a ruler to draw a five-pointed star by connecting the five dots or the five corners of the pentagon. You can carefully cut this star out and use it for a pattern.
